Welcome to the 2023 American Auditory Society (AAS) Scientific and Technical Conference!

Thank you for your interest in this year's American Auditory Society (AAS) Scientific and Technical Conference! This is the 50th anniversary of the Society! We are grateful to the Founders for their vision, and to the dedication of the Past Presidents* and Officers of the Society who carried its torch so diligently. This 3-day conference is a celebration of their vision and dedication. To commemorate this occasion, Dr. Ross Roeser, one of the many distinguished Founders of the Society, will provide a brief recap of the Society's history during the Opening Remarks of the conference!

Like previous years, we have an outstanding program. We have 11 manufacturers reporting on their latest research/products in the Technology Update Sessions. Back by popular demand, we will also have a sponsored session from the Industry Research Consortium (IRC). We have over 250 submissions covering oral presentations and posters from prominent (and soon-to-be prominent) researchers and scientists in hearing and balance! This is a must-attend conference for those who want to feel the pulse of the latest research and development in our field. As usual, we have plenty of opportunities for senior researchers to meet up with your fans and for junior researchers to connect with your idols.

Carhart Memorial Lecture

This year's Carhart Memorial Lecture will be delivered by Monita Chatterjee, PhD, on Communicating Emotional Prosody with Cochlear Implants: Predictors and Mechanisms. Dr. Chatterjee is a Senior Scientist at Boys Town National Research Hospital in Omaha, NE. Her work focuses on both basic and translational aspects of auditory and speech perception by patients with cochlear implants. Dr. Chatterjee's talk will provide an overview of her work investigating predictors of individual variability in emotional communication by children and adults with cochlear implants.

Translational Lecture Series

The 2023 Translational Lecture Series includes three talks from exceptional presenters. Hubert H. Lim, PhD will kick off the lecture series with his talk on Bimodal Neuromodulation for Tinnitus Treatment. Dr. Lim is a Professor in the Biomedical Engineering and Otolaryngology Departments as well as a Translational Neuroscience Scholar at the University of Minnesota. Our second translational lecture, the Killion Lecture, will be presented by John G. Casali, PhD, CPE on Auditory Situation Awareness: The Conundrum When Your Life Depends Upon Your Hearing and Your Hearing Depends on Your Hearing Protector. Dr. Casali is the Grado Professor and Director of the Auditory Systems Lab at Virginia Tech University and the Chief Technology Officer at Hearing, Ergonomics & Acoustics Resources (HEAR), LLC. Our final translational research presentation will be presented by Arvil Genene Holt, PhD on From Bench to Bedside: Approaches for Objective Measures and Treatment of Hearing and Balance Dysfunction. Dr. Holt is an Associate Professor in the Department of Ophthalmology, Visual, and Anatomical Sciences at Wayne State University and a Health Research Specialist at the John D. Dingell VAMC.

Special Session: Uncovering Hidden Hearing Loss: Noise Exposure, Tinnitus and Aging

Our Saturday afternoon Special Session will focus on a deeper understanding of Hidden Hearing Loss. In this special session, Sharon G. Kujawa, PhD will present on Cochlear Deafferentation in Noise-Induced and Age-Related Hearing Loss. Dr. Kujawa is Professor of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery at Massachusetts Eye and Ear and Harvard Medical School. This is followed by Naomi Bramhall, AuD, PhD who will present on Noise-Induced Hidden Hearing Loss: What We Can Learn from Military Veterans. Dr. Bramhall is a research investigator at the VA National Center for Rehabilitative Auditory Research and the Oregon Health & Science University, Department of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery. The final presentation of the day will be delivered by Colleen Le Prell, PhD on Noise-Induced Hearing Disorders: Hidden and Not-So-Hidden Injuries. Dr Le Prell is the Emilie and Phil Schepps Professor of Hearing Science, Chair of the Department of Speech, Language, and Hearing, and Program Head for the PhD Program in Speech, Language, and Hearing Sciences at the University of Texas at Dallas.

Awards

Our President, Dr. René Gifford will provide a membership update and host the Awards & Recognitions session on Friday afternoon. We are pleased to be honoring Brenda Ryals, PhD with the AAS Life Achievement Award. In addition to her many years of service to the Society and her contributions to the profession, Dr. Ryals has been instrumental in building the reputation of the *Ear & Hearing* journal to the level that it enjoys today. We will also announce this year's *Ear & Hearing* Editors' Award and the Readers' Choice Award to be presented by our new Editor-in-Chief of *Ear & Hearing*, Dr. Ruth Litvosky.

Because of the generosity of the NIDCD, the Society is able to support Student Travel Awards. We are indeed indebted to NIDCD for its generous and continual support for the Society.
